Now, it's true that Tony and I have had a difficult summer, with the death of two close family members and all the distress and upset that causes. The parishes have also been busy, perhaps busier than usual, as we try return to all our activities and introduce new ones with Covid still in the background. All in all, life has been quite unsettled, difficult and complicated. But my slip set me thinking about what a quiet life is, especially from a spiritual point of view.

We need challenges and difficulties in our lives. Otherwise, how would we learn? How would we reach our potential, and develop our God-given gifts? We also need some upsets, in order to learn to sympathize with one another, which is a key part of being human. Difficulties, on the other hand, remind us of our own limitations and dependence on God and on other people. But none of these things contributes to a quiet life- quite the opposite, usually.

Where can quietness come from, if we need all these disquieting things in our lives? Well, I think it comes from our relationship with the all-powerful, and all-loving God: from knowing that he is there with us, right in the middle of our troubles, and that he'll continue to hold is in the palm of his hand, however difficult things might be. Then, we can hear his voice whispering suggestions in our ears and saying 'don't worry- everything will be fine'

So, if you feel unsettled or too challenged, and find yourself craving a quiet life, remember all there is to learn from the more difficult and challenging periods of our lives, trust in God's presence and support, and listen for that little voice in your ear.
